(general – dates may be inaccurate)

B. C.

- ? Age of Earth – God created in 6 days and rested on the 7th day, which He sanctified. Note* the 24 hour day was not established right away, so the period of time before that, one might (today) consider eons. Time itself can be a nebulous thing. ex. The only thing Jesus doesn't know, is what 'time' He is returning, but His Father only.
- 4004 Adam and Eve in the Garden of Eden – Adam 'named' the field animals;
(learning to speak words – to talk)
- 3875 Cain murdered his brother Abel out of jealousy [Jesus would later call Abel "the first martyr"; thus confirming the story of Adam and Eve as literal]
- 3874 birth of Seth to 130 year-old Adam; (physically identical to his father) / sons and daughters born to Adam and Eve
- 3700 the wheel
- 3500 cattle pulled plows and carts
- 3074 death of Adam at 930 yrs. old
- 3017 Enoch walked with God and disappeared – God took him. Note* The only other person to disappear would be Elijah.
- 3000 cities in Mesopotamia / smelting of metals; musical instruments
- 2948 Noah born
- 2560 Great Pyramid of Giza
- 2500 Sphinx
- 2448 Noah and 3 sons, Shem, Ham and Japeth, began 100 yr. project to build an ark designed by God / note* Shem would still be alive 75 years after Abraham entered the Promised Land.
- 2348 Oldest man Methuselah, died at age 969 / The Great Flood killed everything with nostrils to breath except those "saved alive" aboard the Ark [note* since the Ark was covered in tar, it is possible that many insects burrowed into the outside of the Ark. Seeds and spores would have survived the flood, along with creatures without nostrils.]
- 2300 giant meteor hit in the area of what is now Southern Iraq
- 2247 Tower of Babel - God wrecked communications by confounding their language; the people scattered , spreading over the land as God originally intended for them to do; but now taking varied languages with them.
- 2024 end of ancient Sumerian civilization
- 2000 Job / Assyria founded / Stonehenge in Britain
- 1998 death of Noah
- 1996 birth of Abram in Ur
- 1986 Sarai born
- 1926 Call of Abram
- 1920 Abram in Egypt
- 1918 Abram separated from his nephew, Lot
- 1913 Lot's capture / Hammurabi, ('Amraphel' of Gen.14) king of Babylon
- 1912 Covenant with Abram for land
- 1910 Sarah's Egyptian handmaid gave birth to Ishmael
- 1900 volcanic eruption Alaskan peninsula
- 1897 Abram – name changed to "Abraham" ("father of many") /
Fire and brimstone rained down on Sodom and Gomorrah; 'stoning' its perverse people and causing the formation of the Salt Sea, (Gen. 14:3); with the exception of one town. The word 'gomorrah' means 'submersion'; (2nd deepest 'hole' on Earth). / [Moab and Ammon] - incest between inebriated Lot and his daughters. They feared they were the only people left on earth.
- 1896 Miraculous birth of Isaac to 100 yr. old Abraham, and 90 yr. old Sarah / male circumcision token of covenant with God on their land
- 1892 God said to 'listen to Sarah'. Ishmael and the maid expelled to the desert of

- Paran / Isaac - the 'legal' heir to God's covenant through long-time marriage partners Abraham and Sarah..
- 1871 Isaac nearly sacrificed by tested Abraham. God provided the sacrificial replacement of a ram on that occasion. [note* If man was willing to give his cherished son to God, then God would be willing to give His cherished Son to man.]
- 1860 death of Sarah
- 1857 Isaac married Rebekah – no children for 20 years
- 1837 twins, Esau (red and hairy) and Jacob were born; God spoke to their mother.
- 1822 death of Abraham
- 1804 Esau belittled and sold his 'first-born son' birthright for food
- 1796 Esau married riotous Hittite women
- 1773 death of Ishmael
- 1760 Jacob obtained blessing from Isaac by deceit – fled from his enraged brother to Padanaram / Esau married Ishmael's daughter out of spite.
- 1753 Laban tricked Jacob into marriage to older daughter Leah / then Jacob also married Rachael, whom he loved, in exchange for years of work.
- 1739 Jacob wrestled angel – name changed to 'Israel'; thought to mean, *the one who fought with God and won*
- 1730 Simeon and Levi massacred men through unholy trickery, to avenge their sister Dinah; causing Jacob's name to "stink".
- 1729 Deborah, the elderly nanny to 3 generations died / Rachel died in childbirth to Benjamin, the youngest of 13 children in total to Jacob
- 1718 Joseph (age 17), sold into slavery by envious brothers / put in Egyptian prison on false charges of attempted rape
- 1716 death of Isaac
- 1706 Israel's family settled in Goshen / Joseph had advanced to Viceroy of Egypt
- 1700 Shang Dynasty of China
- 1689 death of Israel, (Jacob) – body mummified
- 1635 death of Joseph – body mummified
- 1600 alphabet in use / volcanic eruption New Zealand
- 1571 birth of Moses/ retrieved from the waters of the Nile by Pharaoh's daughter
- 1531 exile of Moses for killing an Egyptian and hiding the body in the sand
- 1500 Maya Civilization / massive volcanic explosion in Greece
- 1492 Burning Bush / plagues
- 1491 [various dates to 1200] Exodus - April / Passover / parting of Red Sea for about 3 million people, (Ex. 12:37, 38) / Ten Commandments / golden calf / manna, food sent down from above – about 300 tons per day, except on the Sabbath days; (ended the very day they entered the Promised Land)
- 1490 Tabernacle/ ceremonial law; statutes and ordinances
- 1452 brazen serpent lifted-up, a test of obedience; to heal snake bite. Note* a foreshadowing of Christ 'lifted-up' to save. It is also in the priestly blessing, may the Lord 'lift up' his countenance etc.../ Aaron died on Mt. Hor
- 1451 Death of Moses on Mt. Nebo / angel and Satan contended for his remains / under Joshua, the people passed miraculously over the Jordan River on dry land / walls of Jericho fell down 'flat'
- 1427 death of Joshua
- 1400 Hittites forge iron
- 1361 King Tut
- 1354 oppression by fat Eglon of Moab – 18 yrs
- 1336 Ehud the left-handed champion
- 1312 Boaz married Moabite widow, Ruth
- 1296 Deborah
- 1256 oppression by Midianites – 7 years
- 1249 Gideon
- 1194 Trojan War / Pueblo Indians

- 1171 Angelically pronounced birth of Samuel
- 1166 The child, Samuel was given to priestly service
- 1154 Bad conduct of Eli's, (high priest), sons interfering with worshipers
- 1141 Ark taken by Philistines / death of Eli and family
- 1116 Samson – angelically pronounced birth; man of God, and strong man; killed at least 3000 idolatrous Philistines
- 1095 Israel insisted on a king against God's wishes – very tall Saul chosen
- 1085 Birth of David – youngest of 8 sons
- 1079 Saul rejected by God for self-rationalized disobedience
- 1065 Samuel anointed David secretly
- 1063 22 year old David killed 9 foot Philistine giant, Goliath
- 1060 death of Samuel / Abigail of Carmel fed her protectors. Her bad-tempered husband had a stroke / she married David.
- 1056 deaths of Saul and Jonathan on battlefield – Philistines nailed corpses to wall
- 1050 volcanic eruption Luzon, (Philippines)
- 1048 King David – fought nearly continuously, and acquired all of the God-specified land / Jerusalem – his new capital; a city on a mount, (with a natural spring); which could only be attacked or invaded from its northern position
- 1042 Ark brought to Jerusalem / David danced / Promise of Messiah
- 1033 birth of Solomon to Bathsheba – (she would have 3 more sons)
- 1023 Absalom's rebellion
- 1015 death of David / young Solomon proclaimed king
- 1004 Solomon's extremely glorious and ornate golden Temple for the 'name' of God, completed with lengthy dedication; (and God loved the *child* Solomon) / in Solomon's older years, he would build temples to the false gods of some of his 700 'strange'- (alien) wives and 300 concubines; offending God .
- 1000 Trojan War / smallpox in China / sealed-siphoned aqueduct brought water to Temple
- 995 Queen of Sheba visited Solomon with great pomp and gifts. Being wise herself, she did not marry Solomon.
- 980 Fugitive Jeroboam in Egypt with Shishak
- 974 death of Solomon / Rehoboam disrespected his subjects – they walked away from him / Kingdom divided into two separate realms, Israel and Judah.
- 954 Good King Asa received answer to prayer for deliverance from a million attacking Ethiopians
- 926 Pharaoh Shishak destroyed S. 'fortresses' called "strongholds"; [etched in stone at Temple of Amon in Karnak]
- 918 Israel's idolatrous King Ahab, (meaning *father's brother*); and evil wife Jezebel, (meaning *unmarried*) / wild man Prophet Elijah
- 917 King Jehoshaphat of Judah
- 900 Nineveh rose to World Power / Hiel rebuilt Jericho, falling under Joshua's *Jericho Curse* – death of first and last offspring.
- 884 Jehu fought ferociously against Baal worship
- 878 Joash – boy king – grandfather of Prophet Isaiah
- 850 Prophet Elisha helped the widow and two sons of Prophet (probably Obadiah), with oil miracle
- 842 Prophet Zechariah – important vision of Christ's Second Coming
- 840 death of the Prophet Elisha
- 830 The Mesha stele left by Moab bears the names YAHWEH and House of David
- 787 King Uzziah
- 785 Jonah swallowed by a "big fish"; (a *whale* according to Christ) -[memorial mound discovered dedicated to Jonah]
- 776 first Olympiad
- 772 leprosy suddenly came upon King Uzziah for trying to offer incense illegally
- 763 eclipse of sun
- 753 Rome founded

- 750 blind Homer's Iliad and the Odyssey
- 749 King Jotham
- 741 Prophet Amos – (not the father of Isaiah) / King Ahaz
- 740 Rampant with idols and sins, most of the Kingdom of Israel carried away captive by the Assyrians; as was prophesied in warnings repeatedly. Unlike Judah, they would not receive a foreign edict granting legal permission to return.
[Would become known as *The Lost Ten Tribes*]
- 726 Hezekiah
- 722 Great Passover
- 721 After a 3 year siege, capital city of Samaria and the rest of Israel carried away by Assyrians, - hooks through some captives' lips - 27,290 captives
- 716 Sargon invaded Arabia, (desert between Edom and Babylon)
- 710 Hezekiah's illness – God added 15 yrs. to his life. Unfortunately he would go on to father a very evil son.
- 701 Blaspheming Assyrians before the walls of Jerusalem. Angel mysteriously killed 185,000 Assyrians overnight / Isaiah mentions Cyrus by name, 120 yrs. before Cyrus was born / description of Christ
- 697 Evil Manasseh - filled Jerusalem with blood – idolatry everywhere
- 679 Prophet Isaiah placed in a log and sawn in half, by Manasseh
- 670 Settlement of foreigners and half-breeds in Israel by Esar-haddon
- 663 Fall of Thebes
- 659 Byzantium founded
- 647 Manasseh's sorrowful reform unacceptable; (too little too late)
- 640 Josiah
- 639 Prophet Zephaniah, (a great grandson of Hezekiah), predicted a future of "pure language", (Truth / Gospel)
- 626 Child Prophet Jeremiah, called from 2 ½ miles N.E. of Jerusalem
- 625 Babylon declared independence from Assyria
- 621 The Book found / Josiah's reformation
- 607 (or 612) Megalopolis, Nineveh - pop. 1 million – fell (about 164 yrs. after Jonah) 606 Judah
conquered by Babylon –Jehoiachin and prominent citizens, including
Daniel and young friends, (courtiers to King Zedekiah), were carried away to
Babylon; / Scythian, (Hun-like hordes), invaded the region of Israel coming from
the North.
- 605 Babylon rose to World Power / Battle of Carchemish left Egypt in ruins.
- 604 Nebuchadnezzar
- 598 Prophet Habakkuk
- 597 Ezekiel in Babylon; Zedekiah and 10,000 captives taken to Babylon; a painful and difficult trip covering about 500 miles through deserts to the East.
- 591 Prophet Ezekiel's vision of temple infamy
- 588 Siege of Jerusalem
- 586 Nebuchadnezzar destroyed Solomon's Temple- August 15th / Jerusalem
burned / ark vanished / final captivity / Daniel and friends thrown into the fiery
furnace (with a divine person); they were supernaturally unharmed
- 583 Nebuchadnezzar's siege of Tyre – seafaring coastal city of enormous commerce
in human slavery, animals, and every sort of merchandise; worshiped the idol
Neptune
- 582 Nebuchadnezzar plundered Moab, Ammon, Edom and Lebanon
- 580 Colossal gold idol in Babylon / birth of Cyrus the Great, (Persian Empire)
- 573 Tyre fell to Nebuchadnezzar - (its king compared through metaphor to Satan)
- 570 Queen Esther, elevated from a captive to wife of King Xerxes; father of Darius
- 572 Ezekiel's 2nd vision of Jerusalem, with temple specifications [some say dates were
484-463]
- 561 Death of Nebuchadnezzar; [his black cameo is in the Berlin Museum]
- 560 Temple of Zeus in Athens
- 551 Confucius

- 550 largest Greek theater in the ancient world in Sicily
- 539 writing on the wall – *you have been weighed in the balances and found wanting* / Daniel in lion's den / Cyrus the Persian took Babylon Oct. 12th in accordance with Isaiah 45: 1-13; after 1 year under Darius the Mede
- 537 Jews return to Jerusalem after 70 plus years; cured of idolatry/* note: but they brought back the ideas for the Babylonian Talmud of Ancestor traditions, which by the time of Christ, the scribes and Pharisees preferred over the Holy Bible Old Testament's true teachings of righteousness; the Talmud contains perversions influenced by Babylonian ways.
- 536 Foundation of 2nd Temple – weeping with gratitude - rebuilding
- 524 Buddha
- 520 Prophets Zechariah and Haggai
- 516 Temple dedicated with great joy
- 510 Roman Republic began
- 500 Classical Greek art
- 480 Euripides
- 474 Ezra - priest, scribe, expert on law – codified Torah
- 458 Nehemiah, (governor)
- 450 Prophet Malachi prophesied the return of Elijah, (John the Baptist) just before Messiah
- 444 Wall of Jerusalem rebuilt
- 430 Judea a Persian province
- 404 Athens surrendered to Sparta ending Peloponnesian War
- 399 Socrates self-executed by poison
- 397 Plato
- 391 death of Nehemiah
- 375 Aramaic language as well as Hebrew, being used by Jews
- 343 Aristotle tutored Alexander
- 333 Samaritans, (mixed colonized people), built illegal temple on Mt. Gerizim, / [a people shunned at the time of Christ. They had their own version of the Commandments as well] Christ spent 2 days with them.
- 332 Alexander the Great – conquered Egypt and installed Greeks to all high posts / moved on to Jerusalem / built gymnasium; forced sports; introduced rice to the Israeli diet
- 331 Alexander, at age 21, destroyed Persian Empire on Oct. 1 – Battle of Gaugamela, (east of today's Mosul, Iraq); / conquered Middle East
- 323 Alexander died in Nebuchadnezzar's palace / Ptolemy I, son of one of Alexander's generals, became satrap of Egypt.
- 320 Ptolemy took Jerusalem
- 305 Ptolemy declared himself king of Egypt. Future kings would bare the same name; and often marry their sisters who were often called 'Cleopatra'
- 300 beginnings of Paris
- 250 70 intellectual translators worked on Pentateuch / Septuagint
- 247 lighthouse of Alexandria – 3rd tallest bldg. in the world
- 226 Earthquake caused harbor Colossus of Rhodes to snap off at the knees
- 221 Great Wall of China
- 200 Theophrastus – *The History of Plants* / Rosetta Stone
- 198 Judea under Syrian, (Seleucids) control
- 174 Greek government in Jerusalem
- 168 Antiochus Epiphanies tried to exterminate Jews; offered a sow on the altar; destroyed all copies of scripture that could be found.
- 167 Antiochus devoted Jewish Temple to false god
- 166 Heroic Jewish Maccabean Revolt
- 165 Rededication of Temple, [Feast of Dedication]
- 149 Another illegal temple, (see 333 BC), – this one modeled after the one in Jerusalem, was built in Heliopolis, Egypt

- 140 Essene sect founded monastery in Qumran
- 100 Julius Caesar born / volcanic eruption Aleutian Islands
- 94 Pharisees lost civil war - 50,000 Jews killed
- 88 Ptolemy X lynched by Alexandrian mob for murdering his mother
- 71 Spartacus slave revolt, suppressed by Pompey – 6000 crucified along the Appian Way
- 63 Pompey made Judah/Israel a client kingdom of Rome called Judaea. The 10 non-Jewish cities were named Decapolis. Pompey captured Jerusalem. When he entered the Holy of Holies chamber, there was no Ark (see 586 BC)
- 59 Julius Caesar married-off his daughter Julia to the elderly Pompey
- 58 Caesar in Gaul
- 54 Julia died in childbirth – child died also – Caesar hated Pompey
- 53 Old Testament manuscripts put in earthenware jars, (Dead Sea Scrolls)
- 51 Cleopatra VII ruled
- 48 Caesar defeated Pompey’s army in Greece / Pompey assassinated in Egypt – his head brought in a jar and presented to Julius Caesar, hoping it would please him
- 44 Julius Caesar assassinated by disgruntled colleagues in March, (Ides of March) led by Brutus and Mark Anthony. / Cleopatra murdered her brother.
- 43 A friend of Julius Caesar, Herod Antipater the Idumaeen, son of the Governor of Edom, and first Roman-installed Procurator of Judea, was poisoned; his territory divided. Galilee went to Herod the Great, (self named), who was appointed Roman tetrarch of Galilee by Mark Anthony.
- 42 suicide of Brutus
- 41 Herod the Great married Miriam of the powerful Hasmonean , (Maccabees family) endearing himself to Rome.
- 40 Roman Senate made Herod the Great king of Judea
- 37 Mark Anthony married Cleopatra (who already had a son, Caesarian, by Julius Caesar) / fraternal boy-girl twins born; and a third child, Ptolemy. Mark Anthony gave Roman land to Cleopatra, (considered unconstitutional by the Senate); offended Rome by ignoring his legal wife Octavia, the daughter of Octavian, (Augustus), the adopted son of Julius.
- 32 Mark Anthony divorced Octavia; planned to rule the eastern half of the world. / The Antonia Fortress was erected on the N.W. Corner of the temple; (it would later be where Christ would be questioned by Pilate); named after Mark Anthony by its builder, Herod
- 31 earthquake in Israel – 6.4 magnitude / Mark Anthony shamefully deserted Egyptian Navy which was destroyed by a general under Octavian, (Augustus) in the Battle of Actium.
- 30 Egypt a Roman province / Cleopatra VII’s suicide by the bite of an asp / Mark Anthony’s suicide / her son by Julius Caesar was killed by Octavian, thus ending the Ptolemies, and leaving Octavian the only heir to Julius Caesar and the only defender of Rome. Mark Anthony’s ex-wife, Octavia, took his children by Cleopatra. They lived for a time.
- 29 Herod executed his wife Miriam and her brother (end of Hasmonean Dynasty)
- 27 Augustus , (Octavian)- first official ‘Emperor’
- 20 birth of Mary
- 19 Herod the Great enlarged, (rebuilt) 2nd Temple into a mammoth structure
- 15 Roman Empire extended to absorb Dacia, which was renamed Romania
- 7 Herod the Great executed 3 sons whom he perceived as threats to his throne.
- 5 Angelically pronounced birth of John the Baptist. He went to live in the desert alone with God, as soon as he was old enough; survived on locust and wild honey
- 4 Herod the Great erected a statue to Augustus. / Christ born to the Virgin Mary in ‘Bethlehem’, (‘House of Bread’), fulfilling prophecies / Joseph - warned in a dream, they fled to Egypt / “slaughter of the innocents” by Herod the Great to stop prophesied future Holy King, Jesus Christ, from deposing him / Shortly before his death, Herod ordered all heads of families to attend him. They were

detained on the horse racing grounds with orders for their executions.
Upon Herod's death at age 69, his sister spared and released them.

- 6 Augustus made Judaea a Roman province. / Child Jesus separated from 'parents' at Passover
- 10 birth of Saul, (Paul); / Zechariah, (speculated the same as the father of John the Baptist), murdered in Temple
- 20 Saul, a Pharisee from a privileged family, was well educated and may have been tutored by Gamaliel along with fellow student, Herod Agrippa I
- 22 Herod the Great's son, Herod Antipas, built city of Tiberius by the Sea of Galilee
- 26 Baptism of Jesus Christ – audible Voice from God the Father – Holy Spirit in the form of a dove; (Father, Son, and Holy Spirit) / At his birthday celebration, Herod Antipas beheaded John the Baptist; and began to seek occasion to kill Jesus of Nazareth, (who had very quickly become famous).
- 27 miracles – hoards of followers
- 28 Sermon on the Mount – miracles– fed thousands - forgave sins – parables –Light of the World
- 29 fed more thousands – miracles – transfiguration – Good Shepherd
- 30 Raised Lazarus – miracles – triumphal entry – cleansed Temple – Last Supper, Christian Blood Covenant – *fruit of the vine* symbolic of sacrificial blood, and *bread* symbolic of body of Christ - called 'Communion' – a memorial / Trial –taken before Roman governor Pilate and King Herod Antipas (those enemies became evil friends through the ordeal) / Jesus Christ Crucified [possibly April 3rd 33 A.D.] at 9:00 AM –darkness at noon- died at 3:00 PM; veil ripped in two pieces from top to bottom; extremely severe earthquake/ [note* once a year a team of horses was attached to the veil , so hard it was to remove, in order to clean it. This gives you some idea of the extent of the damage caused by that earthquake, which could rip the veil.] The earthquake fissure began at the cross, traveled through the temple and on to the Mount of Olives. When Christ returns and lights on the Mount of Olives, it will split in four directions. Some dead people arose from their tombs and appeared to their families / Christ's body in rich man's tomb / Resurrected Jesus Christ gave 11 appearances over about a 40 day period – (between April 9 and May 18; and later to Paul; and in Revelations vision to John) – He ascended to Heaven from Mount of Olives (near Bethany) – Pentecost / Tiberius the Emperor / John given the responsibility to care for Mary, it is thought that after she passed away, he went out to preach and was immediately arrested and sent to Patmos
- 35 Pilate resigned – during the interim absence of a Roman to take his place, Stephen was publically stoned without prosecutorial consent. / Spectacular conversion of zealous persecutor Saul, (re-named Paul); knocked to the ground and blinded by *The Light (a great irony as Christ had healed so many blind)*
- 37 Emperor Caligula – unspeakable horrors
- 38 First Gentile church in Antioch; believers first called *Christians*; (it had been prophesied that God's people would be called by a *new name*).
- 39 Herod Antipas removed from office by Emperor Caligula....died in Gaul; replaced by Herod Agrippa I
- 40 Lazarus, whom Christ raised from the dead, may have died naturally in France ten years after Christ.
- 41 Gruesome insane Caligula assassinated [note* because the Roman wine was sometimes laced with lead for flavoring, it has been speculated that lead poisoning was to blame for some of the emperors' outrageous behaviors.]
- 43 Conquest of Britain by historian-emperor Claudius / suicide death of Pilate who had retired to Lake Lucerne, Switzerland.
- 44 James, brother of John, executed by the sword of Herod Agrippa; first of the original apostles to be martyred. He had lived 14 years after Christ in Jerusalem. / Herod Agrippa I claimed to be 'divine'. An angel smote him, so that he died from groin parasites Acts12:23 / famine in Jerusalem / Gospel of Mark written – first

- gospel.
- 45 Macedonian Queen Helena in Jerusalem – aided famine victims
- 47 1st Missionary Journey – Paul and Barnabas bore alms to Jerusalem/ covered
1,400 miles
- 48 5,984,072 Roman citizens worldwide
- 50 First Christian Council at Jerusalem – chaired by James the Just, (half, or step-
brother, or cousin to Christ – not an original apostle) – Forbid eating food offered
to idols and a few offensive practices / 2nd Missionary Journey – Paul and Silas /
Gospel According to St. Matthew – (a tax collector Christ chose as an apostle).
- 51 repeated earthquakes in Rome; Claudius expelled the Jews for disturbances
- 53 3rd Mission
- 54 Nero, age 16, succeeded Claudius on Oct.13- morbid fear of grapes – loved public
to adore him; often wouldn't allow audiences to leave; (one woman gave birth
while waiting to be allowed to leave one of his 'artistic' performances).
- 57 Paul before Felix; (Herod Agrippa II was king)
- 58 Gospel According to St. Luke - (not an original apostle, but a disciple) -
the Greek physician and sometime-companion and helper to Paul, (who had eye
problems)
- 59 Nero murdered his mother
- 60 Paul appealed to Caesar (Nero) / Celtic queen and warrior Boudicca,
decimated Roman Legion in Britain / After building many church buildings, the
Apostle Thomas, (The Twin), was killed from a lance thrown by an envious
Brahmin, 30 years after Christ, on December 21. / St. Andrew, apostle and
brother of Peter, was dragged before a tribunal and condemned to death for
preaching Christianity. Aigeatis, governor of Patros (Greece), ordered Andrew to
be roped to a cross. He languished for 3 days worshipping Christ, saying,
"...whom I saw, whom I love, and in whom I am..." / Matthew may have
been killed in Alexandria. / Barnabus killed by Jews in Cyprus; buried by Mark,
along with a manuscript of the gospel / Mark died Easter Day in Alexandria,
having been dragged by rope through the streets for two days in a row. It rained
heavily. / Huge earthquake destroyed Laodicea, a wealthy city known for selling
eye salve; (possibly used by Paul). It's church mentioned in Rev.
- 61 Paul's shipwreck off the island of Malta
- 62 Death of Roman Governor, Festus. / James the Just, thrown from the top of the
temple after proclaiming Christ to the people gathered below; survived the fall;
a fuller committed an act of 'mercy killing'.
- 63 End of the Book of Acts – (written by Luke)
- 64 Nero had plans to entirely rebuild Rome; (the city built on seven hills). He would
have to clear out the city to do this / Night of July 18th fire broke out near the
Colosseum and Rome burned for 9 days.
Christians were conveniently blamed; but eventually the charge diminished and
they were tortured and killed in merciless ways for sport, appalling even
Romans. / Nero erected a Colossus Statue of himself / Gospel According to St.
Mark; the gentile disciple of Peter called, 'John Mark'. He may have based this
gospel on those things repeated by Peter. His mother owned a home in Jerusalem
used for meeting; (Acts 12:12). [It is speculated that her home was the place with
the upper room, used for the last supper, and that Mark had been the boy
'streaker' who fled at the time of the arrest of Jesus.] / Matthias, (the apostle who
replaced Judas), was killed with a lance or axe, in Judea.
- 65 Peter [THE ROCK]. He had been staying at the spacious home of a friend in
Rome. He was arrested for being Christian, and thrown into the diabolical Roman
prison of the Mamertine. It was cut into solid rock, with one cell over another.
The bottom held the dead and the excrement, while the top held chained prisoners
in darkness and stench. This dungeon had been used since 45 years before Christ.
It's only light came from the small opening at the top. Peter was chained to a
column, in an upright position. He preached – 2 guards and 47 prisoners were

- converted. After 9 months, frustrated Nero had him taken out and crucified. By Peter's request, it has been said, the crucifixion was up-side-down so as not to be as honorable as the Lord's crucifixion. – it was summer. / [Peter was never the first 'pope' of Rome; He was against men lording themselves over others (1 Peter 5:3)] / Nero kicked his pregnant wife to death.
- 67 Paul beheaded by Nero , (he could not be crucified because he was a Roman citizen) / Jewish war / miles of Roman catacombs for hiding / Nero drove a 20-horse chariot in the Olympic Games, (which had been delayed a year for his sake), and was embarrassingly thrown to the ground – he granted Greek liberty, then killed many Greeks before returning to Rome.
- 68 Facing an execution of being beaten to death, Nero killed himself June 9th. He was 31, and the last Julian-Claudian emperor. The number of his name was 666.
- 69 Another fire in Rome; and many small earthquakes resulting in crop disruptions.
- 70 Romans, led by Titus, looted, burned and demolished the 2nd Temple in Jerusalem – maniacally killed starving people and burned the city, on the anniversary of the 1st temple's destruction – August 15th – a great horror prophesied by Christ, which no one believed at His time, since the Temple looked indestructible
- 71 Uncertain dates. Some say 96 A.D. John released from Patmos island imprisonment / Gospel According to St. John / Book of Revelations
- 74 Roman siege of Masada, overlooking Dead Sea; mass suicides / [fabric recovered from Masada closely matching the fabric of the Shroud of Turin]
- 79 Mt. Vesuvius erupted / Luke died naturally in Greece at age 84. He had never married.
- 80 'completion' of Colosseum in Rome / Apostle Philip, whose name meant *one who raises horses*, and whose original home was in Caesarea Philippi, (not the same as Caesarea) was crucified and stoned for condemning serpent worship near Hierapolis. He had 4 daughters called 'prophetesses'. / Apostle Nathanael Bartholomew flayed alive, (or killed by knife), in Armenia after leaving 'India', (a name for a large mass of land tract). He left behind a copy of the Gospel of Matthew / 3rd big fire broke out in Rome
- 91 Arch of Titus erected in Rome commemorating destruction of Jerusalem. Scene depicted Titus with Temple Candelabra. This is how people came to know what the menorah actually looked like. It also depicts the (gold) shewbread table and the (silver) trumpets. Romans are carrying plackards which would have told of other victories in the region. Note* see Luke 19: 41-44 and Matt. 23:37-39
- 100 John died naturally at the age of 100 at the big church at Ephesus; (his brother James, had been the first original apostle killed, and John was the last to pass away). John repeated one message, "Little children, love one another." / Death of Herod Agrippa II
- 105 paper commonly used for writing
- 116 Roman Empire reached to its farthest extent under Trajan
- 122 Hadrian's Wall – (England and Scotland)
